Nobles, Ladies, and Friends,

We are now into the summer and have had several events that have taken place here at Acca. One I am so proud to report to you is the "Pork and Music Festival" that was held on May 7th. It appears that we will do better than we did last year thanks to the hard work of the committee and the temple members. Thanks to all the volunteers that made the day a very successful one. We have had numerous positive comments on the event and some suggestions for improvement.

The Auction Driving fund raiser is still in full swing. We really need more drivers to participate. We can have as many as 30 drivers per week and are only getting about 20. That equates to \$360.00 per week we are losing. If this continues we will lose about \$12,000.00 this year due to non participation. That is almost as much as the Pork Festival revenues. Unit and Club leaders, please encourage your members to help with this very easy fund raiser for our Temple.

The May 17th Business Meeting produced 5 new novices for our Temple, 1 associate member, 6 demits, 1 suspension, 20 deaths, for a net loss of 23 for the first 4 months of 2016. If this trend continues through the year and with the year end non payment of dues suspensions our numbers will drop below 1300 members. We really need to work on the membership program and take the matter seriously. We had the PACE Program here on June 20th of last year to help us with our efforts to start growing the numbers. This is a two year program and the membership committee is working hard to make it a success. We need your help and I know that we can do better if we work at it.

We need to thank all of the unsung heroes we have here at Acca. Nobles Karl Hawks, David Eells, and James Sadler are among those that do so much to keep our facility in good repair and appearance. You don't see them when they are taking care of little problems or cleaning up messy areas, but they are there. When you see these Nobles give them a pat on the back and let them know that they are appreciated. Also thanks to the Legion of Honor for planting the beautiful mums in our memorial garden. Well done! Some Shriners make things happen, other watch things happen, and others wonder what happened.

Pledge of Allegiance

The Military Salute is used when reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and during the playing or singing of the National Anthem.

"I pledge allegiance to the flag, of the United States of America, and to the republic for which it stands, one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all"

The Potentate or designated individual will cause the Nobility to come to attention and salute at the proper time.

With the audience standing silently facing the platform the color bearer, followed by escort, marches to the front and faces the audience. Escorts take positions on either side of the Flag bearer. The audience may then recite the pledge of allegiance and sing the national anthem. Flag bearer places Flag in its stand. Audience is seated. Flag detail departs.

Acca ended the month of May with 5 Gains and 29 Losses for a current total of 1,362 members. This is a net loss of 24 members (or 1.7%) for the year. Following Imperial's recommendations, the Committee has set membership goals for each of the Unit and Clubs of 5% new creations. For many, this equates to only 1, 2 or 3 new members for the entire year! Let us make a serious effort to discuss membership with our Brethren in Blue Lodge and to encourage them to attend one of our Shrine meetings, fundraisers, events or parades. It is understood that recruiting new members can be difficult, but we must continue to reach out, step outside of our comfort zone and give a Brother a petition. For more than 140 years, Shriners have influenced society as a fraternal organization dedicated to the Masonic principles of truth, relief and brotherly love. The governing body of Shriners International, founded on June 6, 1876, was originally known as the Imperial Grand Council of the Ancient Arabic Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine (A.A.O.N.M.S.) for the United States of America.

Today, Shriners are renowned for their participation in parades, conventions and circuses – and are recognized by their distinctive fezzes. Shriners host events in a spirit of fun, fellowship and philanthropy, often through their local clubs and units under the jurisdiction of the 196 temples (chapters) throughout the world.

In 1922, following the polio outbreak in the United States, Shriners leaders founded Shriners Hospitals for Children^{*} in an effort to make a difference in their community. Today, there are 22 Shriners Hospitals for Children, providing expert specialty care in the areas of orthopaedics, burns, spinal cord injuries and cleft lip and palate. Each child receives the highest quality medical care, regardless of a family's ability to pay.

Today, we acknowledge and offer our gratitude to our Shriners who continue the tradition and make these good works possible. The foundation of our philanthropic success is built upon the fraternity which made it all possible. It is our Shriners who first provided Love to the Rescue[®].





Hospital Committee Report

ACCA Council Meeting 4.26.16

We are sending children currently, to 11 different Hospitals. The full time screening clinic being held at Dr. Richard Redman's office is producing screenings with applications forwarded to the appropriate Shrine Hospitals. The Richmond Follow-up Clinic seems to be progressing slowly.

Average cost per month, YTD, is \$ 3,917. We currently have 23 Shrine Drivers and 5 Ladies .We have had 21 trips with 23 patients, through March. March was a slow month but YTD was on par with 2015. Thanks to all of the drivers for allowing us to take care of our shrine kids and stepping up to drive for last minute trips. Most of our air flights are to Boston so far this year, and are Commercial flights. One patient has to go monthly.

The Hospital Policy and associated documents have been revised with the changes approved by the Board of Directors at the end of 2015, as stated previously and remember that we can now have Master Masons as a driver when paired with a shrine driver. Nobles please talk to your Units, Clubs and Blue Lodges about this. It can be a "win-win", whereby we can possible get new shriners from this program....and we certainly need these as well as drivers

The committee of (4) Nobles/drivers, have selected our next van for purchase, and all paperwork has been filed by John Larson and the Recorder, Pete Holder with Tampa. We will have to wait until the Board of Trustees for Shriners Hospitals meets to approve the request. This is normally just a formality.

We still need additional drivers (both Nobles and their Ladies. Please consider driving for the Transportation Team. Ralph Heard would like to have more drivers to choose from. We have lost some of our drivers due to aging out, illness or family illness... and please take this back to your Unit and Club Membership and mention it. Have them contact Ralph or John Larson if they are interested.

If you would like to help the Hospital Committee, the meetings are held the first Tuesday night of each month at 7:30pm in the Trophy Room and are open to all Nobles and their Ladies. You are welcome and encouraged to participate.



Embrace your brace!

That is the message 11 year old Katie is hoping to pass along to other scoliosis patients at #SHCGreenville and anyone else who must wear an orthotic or brace. Katie has learned firsthand the importance of brace compliance. Her once 26 and 20 degree S-shaped spinal curves are now 10 and 6 degrees!

But Katie hasn't been the only one to embrace her brace. She knows that along with support from her family, it is support from her friends that makes a huge impact. "If my friends didn't support me I probably wouldn't wear the brace as much as I am supposed to wear it," Katie says. "I usually wear my brace for 22 hours a day. For two years I've done everything with my brace on. I never take it off unless I'm swimming or showering."

Katie's school has also been instrumental in her brace compliance. When she first returned to school with her brace, they allowed her to pick two "brace buddies" to be trained to help Katie put on and take off her brace if it needed adjusting during the school day. Katie chose friends Camille and Quinlan. "I thought it was going to be a lot bulkier, but you can hardly tell Katie has a brace on," says Camille.

This past year, Katie's brace may have been the best recess prop in fifth grade as classmates tried to see how far footballs and soccer balls would ricochet off of Katie. "There isn't anything Katie can't do with her brace on. Katie runs, plays soccer, football, everything," says Quinlan. "One time, I was playing goalie and the ball hit my brace, bounced off and nailed the person who had just kicked it knocking him down," Katie adds. "It was so funny!"

A few months ago, when it was time for Katie to choose a pattern for her new brace, her teacher showed all the options on the classroom smart board and the whole class got involved in the process and voted on their favorite. "Everyone in my school knows I wear a back brace. It's really no big deal," Katie says, "I just want other patients to know that it's ok to wear your brace. Just rock your brace! Embrace your brace! It could make a difference, like it did for me."

Katie's brace buddies came to her most recent check-up at the Greenville Shriners Hospital. During the visit Quinlan and Camille learned just how much their help and support made a difference in Katie's life. "I had no idea that she could have had to have spine surgery if her brace hadn't helped her. Now I'm really glad we help Katie with her brace!" Camille exclaimed.








The Director's Staff

Hunter

After having 18 surgeries at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Greenville, Hunter Jarman has the routine down pat. His favorite part is when the nurses in the pre-op holding area roll out a big red wagon full of toys for patients to pick from before they go into the operating room. The toy will be waiting for them when they wake up.

Hunter has been a patient at the Greenville Shriners Hospital for twelve years where he receives expert pediatric orthopaedic care for infantile idiopathic scoliosis, a curvature of the spine. As a very young child with a severe curvature, Hunter was placed in Mehta casts to help manage his curve while he continued to grow. When the cast is applied, pressure is placed on the cast causing the spine to straighten. When the cast hardens, it holds the spine in this position. Each cast progressively straightens the patient's spine. In all, Hunter wore 15 Mehta casts.

With the curvature beginning to penetrate the area of the chest where his lungs would be, in November 2013, Hunter had growing rods implanted into his spine. Growing rods are recommended for pre-teen and teenage patients who have a high degree curvature and who have a significant amount of growing still left. Hunter's mom, Pam, says, "With only one lengthening so far, Hunter has grown seven inches and the rods have taken his 143 degree curve down to about 60 degrees. He is able to breathe better with the pressure off the lungs. It is such a good thing that these surgeries can help him feel better each day." Hunter will continue to have surgery every four to six months until he is finished growing. At that time, his spine will be fused with permanent rods, hooks, and screws.

Along with scoliosis, Hunter also has ocular albinism, asthma, mitral valve insufficiency, and Ehlers Danlos Syndrome, a congenital connective tissue disorder. Hunter is treated for these conditions at Children's Miracle Network hospitals.

Our number one priority continues to be finding and caring for new patients. The Spring Clinic in Puerto Rico was a real boost with 58 new patients identified. Through April admissions have increased 111 over the same period last year. A real tribute to Board Members, staff and all Shriners who work hard to help children in need of the care we provide.

Tele-Health is a real growing opportunity for Shrine Hospitals. SHC-P is one of the pilot hospitals engaged in this effort and we're working hard to make it a success. With the technology available today it's possible for physicians at SHC-P to evaluate and provide services to patients in collaboration with medical professionals at a remote site. One pilot site is in Danville, VA. More about this in future issues.

Last year, the physicians at SHC-P completed 400 spine surgeries for children from across the US and many other countries. 3000 Pedicle screws were used in these surgeries to attach tethers or rods to children's spines for treatment of Scoliosis. Great care must be taken to assure the screws are properly placed and do not affect the spinal cord or other nerves. When screws are not properly placed Additional surgery is required at a cost of \$22,000 and additional pain and discomfort for a child when a screw is improperly placed in the initial surgery. There is an available option available to avoid errors and make the surgery safer for the patient and reducing the amount of radiation to which the patient and medical team are both exposed. The option is a "Computer Assisted Navigation System" The Board of Trustees has approved a \$1,000,000 fund raising initiative in order to provide this very valuable aid to our physicians and reduce risk for our patients.

The opportunity that Ill Jimi Duke provided for me to speak about SHC-P at the Spring Ceremonial Open House was most appreciated. It allowed an opportunity to show a video and introduce our Hospital to those present. The is the 90th anniversary year of SHC-P. The video is available to show at Unit, Club or Lodge meetings. All you have to do is call, text or e-mail me (804.397.9272; ray@rrgood.com).



Known for his dedication and concern for children with arthrogryposis

Sometimes distance just doesn't matter. Ten-year-old Tatum and her family are happy to make the three-hour trip from their home in Deer Park, N.Y., to Shriners Hospitals for Children —



Philadelphia to see Harold van Bosse, M.D., a pediatric orthopaedic surgeon who is recognized worldwide for his expertise in treating children who have arthrogryposis.

Dr. van Bosse is an excellent surgeon. But his patients say they seek him, and stay with him, as much for his attitude as his surgical skills and medical knowledge. "Dr. van Bosse sees my daughter as

a person, not a

statistic or just another patient," said Eileen, Tatum's mom. "He always gives us as much time and attention as we need. He answers every question (even when we repeat them over and over)."

WHAT IS ARTHROGRYPOSIS?

Arthrogryposis is a congenital condition characterized by multiple joint contractures and muscle weakness. In Tatum's case, the condition affects her lower extremities; in addition to the arthrogryposis, she also has club feet and hip dysplasia. Her initial orthopaedic surgeon realized Tatum needed more specialized care and suggested she be seen by Dr. van Bosse for a more definitive diagnosis and treatment plan.

A PHYSICIAN DETERMINED TO MAKE A REAL DIFFERENCE

Dr. van Bosse first saw Tatum when she was about 18 months old. Since then, Tatum has undergone multiple castings to correct her club feet, multiple surgeries on her hips and knees and had her Achilles tendon lengthened. She is scheduled for still another surgery in a few months. Today, Tatum is able to walk without assistive devices, but she does so at her own pace and can't always keep up with the other children.

Tatum is a very active, happy and friendly child. She loves to sing, dance, play the flute, spend time with her sister, Leila, and bake. She is also a Girl Scout and has gone to hippotherapy (therapeutic horseback riding), which she loves, and is involved in school clubs and activities. Tatum has already realized that

others face more severe difficulties and challenges. "She is very empathetic and sympathetic," said Eileen. "She is always thinking of others and how she can help them."

Still, like any child coping with a complex medical condition, she occasionally questions her situation. When she does, and asks Dr. van Bosse if she is going to get better, he always

encourages her, and tells her there is nothing 'wrong' with her - she is fine, and will be fine. His innate understanding of the emotional encouragement needed by kids with disabilities is deeply appreciated by his patients' parents.

"His compassionate, respectful and comforting demeanor is priceless," said Eileen. "We would travel the world to continue to have Dr. van Bosse in our lives."

This commitment to ensuring that our patients recover to the fullest extent possible, able to pursue their goals and dreams as much as possible, regardless of physical difficulties is a hallmark of the Shriners Hospitals for Children health care system's approach to care.
