
Potentate's Message


From the Recorder's Pen

Welcome to Spring Finally........
Spring SASA was held this year in Kingsport, TN, during the last weekend of March. Most of the Divan attended, to show support for the 5th Vice President, our own Ill Sir Thornton Holt. All 20 Temples in the South Atlantic Shrine Association were represented, and it was nice being able to compare notes with members of the other Temples. We all have pretty much the same problems. Everyone was considering the odds of SASA being cancelled three years in a row by a hurricane. Probably the odds of winning the lottery are much better.

The first meeting was on Membership. Each Temple was given the statistics for their Temple. The statistics for Acca were not good but were not totally unexpected. Bear with me while I present a few of them:

- 1. Only 15% of Master Masons in Virginia are Shriners
- 2. Acca membership has dropped from 1526 in 2014 to currently 1185.
- 3. As of 3/27/19, we have a net loss of 13 members for this year.
- 4. 195 Nobles have not yet paid their 2019 dues.
- 5. 38 Nobles could be 2 years in arrears at the end of 2019 and will be automatically suspended.



6. If we continue as we are, membership in Acca will be only 699 Nobles in 10 years.

7. As of 4/8/19, we have only received 3 new Petitions this year.

Membership and participation are key elements to the survival of Acca. Of the 1185 current membership, I would guess that not more than 60% are active in Shrine functions, and that figure may be optimistic!

Look around in your Unit or Club meetings and see who isn't there and give them a call to see the reason for their absence. Sometimes just knowing you are missed gives enough encouragement to come back. If an older member has problems getting out at night, offer him a ride to the meeting. It would mean so much.

The Membership Committee is working on ways to attract new members and to retain our current members. If they ask for your help, please assist them.

Our rentals are increasing, which means more revenue for the Temple. There have been a few glitches, but not anything serious. I appreciate the support of the Nobility. If you would like to be a Building Manager during one of the rentals, just let Shannon or me know. It is a well-compensated position.

Our physical plant is greatly improved with the interior renovations, a new roof on the Activity Center, and an unexpected replacement of the old pneumatic control system for the Ballroom HVAC with a new electronic system. A badly needed upgrade of your office computer system should be completed soon. These improvements will last for years and we can all enjoy the benefits.

I hope all have a very pleasant and safe Summer. We deserve it!!

Many of the top named entertainers of that period performed on its stage. Unfortunately, due to the depression, we lost ownership in 1935. The next time you are in the building, take time to look at all the Shrine signs







Motor Patrol





Philadelphia Hospital Report

Greetings from Philadelphia! Happy Spring! I have been asked a number of times over the past several months what's happening in our Shriners Hospitals network. The question is usually coupled with a gloom and doom comment such as, "I heard the [you fill in the blank] hospital is going to close". I welcome questions like this and I think I can speak for the other hospital board and emeritus members as well. While we may not have all the answers to your questions, we know whom to ask to get you the correct answer, even if that answer is 'we don't know.' The reason I welcome questions is twofold, and these are secrets: First, the news media doesn't always get it right. And, second, neither does the Shriner rumor mill. Shocking, I know! So, permit me a few lines to try to dispel some rumors and inform you as best I can.

At our January board meeting, the Philadelphia Hospital leadership team reported on the Leadership Conference held in Tampa. A significant portion of their time was spent discussing how Shriners Hospitals for Children (SHC) needs to change to remain relevant, current, and sustainable. As we have probably all experienced, patient care is rapidly changing from inpatient to outpatient. Nationally and within the SHC system, inpatient days have been steadily decreasing. In fact, SHC U.S. inpatient volume has fallen 31% from 2013 to 2017. More than one-third of our facilities are below the Center for Medicare & Medicare Services (CMS) inpatient volume requirements. (CMS issues the rules that a facility must meet to qualify as a "hospital" in the Medicare Program). During the same period of time, operating expenses for inpatient visits have increased 60%. To put it bluntly, given the current draw on the endowment, our current model of providing care to children is not sustainable. Those facilities within our system that do not meet CMS requirements must transform into something else; it does NOT mean they will close.

So, what's the plan? The plan is two-fold. First, is to optimize our existing structure short-term by increasing focus on outpatient services, consolidating where it makes sense, and creating more community affiliates to both treat children closer to home and reach more kids in need of our special care. Several examples of this effort are taking place right now. The Tampa hospital will become the fifth location in the SHC system to transition to an outpatient care center on or about August 1. At Philadelphia, we are negotiating for leased space in Doylestown, PA, to expand our outpatient presence in that market. SHC-Cincinnati has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding

with Dayton Children's Hospital to explore relocation to the Dayton, Ohio, pediatric hospital. Once legal documents are complete, the Cincinnati Shriners Hospital would lease and occupy separate space on the Dayton campus, remaining a distinct hospital within a hospital. It is estimated that a final move could occur within the next 16 months. Over the past decades, there has been a decline in the severity and number of pediatric burns in the U.S., especially those requiring a lengthy hospital stay. This is due in large part to education and prevention efforts, many of which have been spearheaded by the Shriners Hospital system! This move will enable the Cincinnati Shriners Hospital to deliver its specialty services more efficiently, purchasing certain services from the Dayton hospital.

A long-term study is on a parallel path to "right size" the number of hospitals within the U.S. SHC system by 2035. This vision involves reducing the number of full-service hospitals to one to four Centers of Excellence, based on what we need and what we can afford. While change is never easy, the one constant that will remain is our commitment to the mission–Improving the lives of children by providing pediatric specialty care, conducting innovative research, and offering outstanding teaching programs for medical professionals—so that our system will survive us all.

On a lighter note, Dr. Corinna Franklin was honored to be included in the 2018 Philadelphia Magazine "Top Docs". Dr. Franklin joins Drs. Kozin, Samdani, and Zlotolow in achieving this honor. Dr. Franklin also recently received a \$375 thousand grant to lead sports medicine collaboration among Shriners Hospitals.

Saturday, June 22, will be our Expanded Board Day. Yes, that's right, Saturday! Please see the flyer for details. It promises to be a great day and a wonderful opportunity to tour the hospital, meet our great staff, and see for yourself how we help kids and families every day. Finally, mark your calendars for Saturday, September 28. Planning for the third annual Acca Shriners Walk For LOVE is well underway. More to follow in upcoming communications!

Noble Dave and I are honored to serve on the Philadelphia Hospital Board of Governors and to represent Acca Shrine in that capacity. As always, thanks to all the Nobles and Ladies of Acca Shriners for your commitment to our fraternity and to the World's Greatest Philanthropy.


